


There is a map of the Town of Oakfield on the next page.

North side of Judge Road, 1/8th mile west of Hutton Road Incorporated active cemetery

First burial: c. 1835

Northwest corner of Maple Avenue and Duck Pond Road intersection: a new plot has been purchased and the cemetery will be expanded.

BENJAMIN CASPER

BORN May 19, 1842.

DIED May 10, 1912.

OBITUARY OF BENJAMIN CASPER

Civil War Veteran of Oakfield Died From Paralysis, Aged 71

Oakfield, May 11, 1912 - Benjamin Casper, a Civil War veteran, died yesterday afternoon at his home, the L. L. Reed tenant house on the Hutton road, from the effects of a stroke of paralysis which he suffered on May 1st.

Mr. Casper was born in Germany on May 19, 1841, and came to the United States when a young man. He first located in Alabama, but had been a resident of Oakfield twenty years. He was twice married, the second time to Miss May Brininstool of Alabama, who survives him with three sons, Joseph of Alabama and James and John of Oakfield; three daughters, Mrs. Charles Snyder of Buffalo, Mrs. Hiram Sumeriski of Alabama and Miss Mary Casper of Oakfield, and 11 grandchildren.

The funeral will be from the house at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon and the burial will be in the Reed cemetery.
