They created our Outdoor Learning Center (OLC) in 2014 which is located at the northwest corner of The Interpretive Nature Center parking area. There we can find a variety of interactive displays, from birdwatching to sensory & pollinator gardens and even our messy materials section for the children to enjoy. The ACORNS have been working hard to maintain this area and have some good ideas of what to add next!

Volunteers needed!

Garden Maintenance— There is a need for weeding to maintain the beautiful gardens and features we have installed in the OLC over the years. In recent OLC workdays we have weeded in sections and discussed management methods so we can keep up with those fast growing challenges.

We're working on an "adopt a garden" program, however until it is implemented, we encourage all volunteers to stop by in their free time to give the OLC some TLC. No long-term commitment is necessary, just stop by for a moment of zen volunteer work to help us keep our OLC looking inviting. Even stop by on your way through to or from a hike at the park; Any help is appreciated!

Coming Soon to an OLC Near You...

Upcoming projects for volunteers to help with!!

- 1. Inventory of tree plantings and creation of a map to keep track of species and growth.
- 2. Replace the various tubing around the newer plantings with chicken wire fencing to allow it to spread out and breathe with more available sunlight while still protecting them from the deer.
- 3. Updating and maintaining the pollinator gardens.
- 4. Finishing of the rain barrel water delivery system to help garden maintenance.
- 5. Creation of Art Boxes that visitors will be able to sign out at the front desk. In these boxes you will find various creative materials for the creative minds to utilize at our center.
- 6. Addition of Explorer Boxes which will include binoculars and easy to follow field guides to see what roams in our backyards!
- 7. Addition of signage made for the different areas in the center to explain the purpose of each one. We have also been working on getting identification signs made for the different plants in the center and on the Discovery Trail.

Deer Lord!

White-tailed deer are one of the largest mammals populating New York State. I see them everywhere and as person-sized creatures they have quite a presence in the forest. For these reasons I wanted to learn a bit more about them.

White-tailed deer are native to Nearctic Regions meaning the North American region ranging from northern Mexico all the way to Greenland. Both male and female deer have an average lifespan of about 10 years in the wild, however some get to be close to 25 years old. Males grow antlers in the spring and shed them in the early months of the following year. Breeding season spans from the later autumn to the early winter months, and most fawns are born in the late spring as we are seeing now.

Deer reach sexual maturity around three-years old. A female's first year breeding normally produces one fawn, but in following years it's not uncommon for her to have 2-3 fawns per year. Deer breed once a year taking six and a half months for a full gestation period. They typically mate between October and December, so we get to see the cute Bambis starting to show their white spots in the spring months.

Something to be mindful of this spring is the natural ways that does care for their fawns. A behavior of a mother white-tailed deer is that they leave their fawns alone for several hours in the day to gather food. During this time the fawn is hidden in the woods or grass where it camouflages itself until

the mother returns. However, when a human comes across this innocent little fawn all alone, they often think that the poor thing was abandoned and needs help. When well-meaning people try to take baby deer inside or to an animal rescue center, they are **deer-napping!** In reality, the mother is going about her natural instinctual ways and is returning to her fawn soon. If you come across a baby deer, don't assume it needs help. A lone fawn does not mean abandonment

or orphanage, but if it appears injured or is crying for hours on end then it probably does need help. In this case it is wise to contact the DEC wildlife rehabilitators as they can properly assess and handle the situation.

Another issue with deer to be mindful of is **Chronic Wasting Disease**. So what is this scary sounding disease? Chronic Wasting Disease or CWD is a neurological disease that affect deer along with elk and moose populations. It is contagious and is fatal to deer population. After infection, a deer's brain undergoes "spongy deterioration". This causes the deer to exhibit strange behavior and lose regulatory body functions and ultimately results in death. A deer with CWD will often be stumbling around, drooling, emaciated, have its head lowered to ground more than normal, and have lost its fear of humans. If you see a deer exhibiting these characteristics, you should call your state wildlife agency. If you hunt in the area, you should never eat products from a deer that may look ill. Tom Turnbull of the Batavia Rotary Club was awarded a grant with the help of Jocelyn Sikorski, who was then the executive director of the county and city youth bureaus. Their project then grew to include the use of kayaks for programs with the Genesee County Parks as well as the Liberty Center, county and City Youth Bureaus. Kayaking is a wonderful way to explore the outdoors and facilitate STEM education and healthy outdoor recreation. Huge thanks to Tom, Jocelyn and to all organizations involved for this new opportunity!

Five **Sunscreen Dispensers** are now available at Dewitt Recreation Area! These work just like the touchless automatic hand sanitizer dispensers we've all grown used to. Instead of

alcohol-based germ killer, it gives you **SPF 50** sunscreen.



This addition was made possible through a grant provided to Rochester Regional Health-United Memorial Medical Center's Healthy Living Program. The goal of the project is to help reduce skin cancer, which is the most common form of cancer in the United States.

Sunscreen dispensers are found at each of the park bathrooms, at the south park entrance, at the Route 5 Ellicott Trail kiosk and at the three-tiered fishing platform. This new park amenity is convenient, easyto-use and provides a benefit to community health.

The grant has provided a 2-year supply of sunscreen, and the parks will able to absorb the cost of the sunscreen in subsequent years going forward, as long as it gets used! We hope park visitors will not be shy about using this sunscreen to keep their skin safe and healthy and reduce the risk of skin cancer while enjoying the outdoors!

Walk or run on single and double track trails through the forest, along a creek and up and down rolling hills in the Genesee County Park & Forest, with an estimated 100 feet of climb in the 10K loop. Trails are very wide and easy to negotiate (minimal rocks and roots). The course starts on asphalt and then leads into the woods for a truly beautiful run through the countryside. All proceeds benefit ACORNS, a non-profit 501(c)(3) "friends of the park" group that supports the Genesee County parks by connecting people with nature through outdoor learning, education and fun!

Run for the ACORNS will be held Sunday October 3rd at the Genesee County Park & Forest from 8:00am-1:00pm!






