Firsts of the Year

We humans love keeping track of things. Our brains are hardwired to notice the world around us and relate what we are seeing to things that we understand. Often, we'll find ourselves organizing our busy days and lives into lists and categories, schedules and calendars. A fun way to cater to this side of ourselves, while building a stronger connection with the natural world, is the concept of "Firsts of the Year".

At the First Day Hike, led by the ACORNS on New Years morning, a question I heard many asking their friends and fellow hikers was—what was your first bird of the year? And so we ask you, what was the very first bird that you saw in 2024? As with many traditions among birders, the first bird of the year can become a competition. Some have been known to close their eyes tight on the morning of January 1st, avoiding European starlings and House sparrows in the hopes of seeing a unique first of the year bird!

My first bird of 2024 was a Black-capped chickadee. When I woke up in the morning, I noticed several of them visiting my backyard bird feeders. January 1st was a snowy day, and after a very warm December, our bird feeders had many more visitors than usual!

Noticing firsts of the year doesn't have to be restricted to just birds on January 1st. We can pay attention to just about anything in the natural world— all year round! When will you hear your first Spring Peeper of 2024? When will you see the Maple trees begin to produce buds or the dragonflies start to emerge?

You can also notice "lasts". When will be the last time you see a Palm Warbler? Or the last time you find a flowering Trout Lily on the forest floor?

One of the first plants to produce a flower in Western New York is Skunk Cabbage! It emerges so early in the spring, it has evolved to have thermogenic properties that allow it to melt it's way through frozen ground.

Firsts of the Year

We can tap into natures cycles and deepen our own understanding of the complex and exciting natural world simply by taking the time to notice and observe.

When you start observing "firsts of the year" you're learning about phenology, natures calendar! Phenologists study the timing of natural events, cycles, and phenomena. Events like the budding of leaves in the spring, the arrival of migratory birds, and when plants first produce a flower happen on a schedule. That schedule is deeply connected to the seasons, the climate, and local weather patterns.

If you monitor firsts and lasts of the year you may notice the timing of certain events can change from one year to the next. Or, they may remain consistent, happening on the same day every year. Scientists monitor shifts in this schedule. Any big changes can give us clues as to how climate change and other human impacts are altering the natural world.

Phenology is "natures calendar." It is the study of the timing and cyclical patterns in the natural world. This year, make a New Years resolution to notice as many "firsts" as possible. You can keep track in a nature journal, notebook, or on an online app like iNaturalist or eBird. By the end of 2024, you'll be surprised how much more attuned you are to the natural world around you!

Rex Introduces the GCP Dog Patrol


Hi!

TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE APRIL 8, 2024 · GENESEE COUNTY NY SEE IT WHERE THE SKIES ARE DARKER

#GeneSEEtheEclipse

Phenomena to look for during the Total Solar Eclipse on Monday, April 8th 2024:

- Images of the crescent partially-covered sun are created by any object with small holes in it, such as a colander, hole punched paper, or even your interlaced fingers.
- 10 to 15 min before totality, the air temperature will drop and shadows will become sharper as daylight diminishes.

Frogs may start to sing and birds may become quiet as they respond to the visual cues of twilight

• Shadow bands may appear on the ground or other surfaces 1 to 2 minutes before totality. They are most visible on light-colored surfaces. They appear to be caused by the refraction of the sun's fading light as it passes through turbulent cells of air in the earth's upper atmosphere. They look similar to ripples of sunlight on the bottom of a pool.

The total solar eclipse is the only time that the sun's corona is observable in nature

Planets and bright stars will be visible during totality

- Look at each horizon during totality and you'll see what looks like a 360-degree sunset.
- Baily's beads, the diamond ring, and shadow bands will be visible in reverse order at the end of totality
