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

Pre-Sentence Investigations During A Global Pandemic

As part of the judicial process, the Court may order a Pre- ant's sentencing. Sentence Investigation. A Pre-Sentence Investigation or PSI, is a document that is meant to assist the Court at the time of sentencing. In Genesee County, the PSI is written by a Probation Officer.

For those unfamiliar with the process, the Order for Investigation is received from the Court and the defendant is contacted by phone or mail, sometimes both, and a PSI interview is scheduled. The interview process takes place in person as often as possible. The defendant is directed to bring in certain information including a Birth Certificate, ID, Social Security Card, proof of income, proof of military service if applicable, and education records. The defendant is given the opportunity to make a written statement describing themselves, their crime, and/or their thoughts on their vic-

face-to-face interview. The defendants are informed of the purpose of the PSI and the importance of honesty during the investigation. This is so the sentencing Judge has an accurate understanding of who the defendant is, what they have going on in their lives, and prior experiences that may have shaped who they are. Probation Officers utilize interviewing skills and techniques in an attempt to obtain the

However, with the arrival of the COVID-19 global pandemic, the normal process has been challenged, and some adjustments had to be made in order to ensure this process could be completed, and done safely.

During the pandemic, social distancing protocols are followed to allow in-person interviews when possible. At times, face-to-face interviews have been impossible to complete safely. As a result, telephone and video conferencing have been used to successfully complete this process. An effective interviewer uses active listening skills, reads facial expressions, and carefully structures follow up questions to evoke insightful responses from the defendant.

Another crucial component of a PSI is collecting collateral information, such as treatment history, victim information, and educational documents. Again, this process went through changes during the pandemic. Utilization of our electronic file management system, email correspondence, and scanning has facilitated rapid transmission and organization of documents so that we can continue to function effectively.

The PSI process allows the Probation Department to collect and organize many details of a defendant's life in order to provide the Courts with appropriate sentencing recommendations and, if necessary, conditions of probation specifically tailored to the defendant's rehabilitation. Making some adjustments to our workflow has allowed us to continue providing these important reports in a timely manner to the Court System during this pandemic.

Director's Corner

Calendar year 2020 proved to be a challenging one for probation professionals during the COVID-19 global pandemic. Early on during the outbreak in mid-March, at the direction of Governor Cuomo, we reduced our in-office workforce by 50%. We also temporarily suspended all in-person contacts including home contacts. We immediately transitioned to contacting probationers through electronic means, including telephonic reporting. During this time we began using "Ce Check-In" which is a web-based reporting system that interfaces with our offender management system, Caseload Explorer. This allowed us to enhance our supervision capabilities during this time.

At the end of May, the 50% staffing mandate was lifted and all our employees returned to work full-time, with the exception of two furloughed employees that remained out of work for the next three months. In early June we resumed conducting home contacts on a modified basis, while wearing facial coverings, using hand sanitizer and adhering to social distancing protocols. By the end of June we restarted face-to-face contacts in the office with our high risk offenders and juveniles. In-person investigation interviews and initial interviews resumed as well. Our officers also began utilizing polycarbonate barriers and wiping down offices between contacts to help minimize the spread of the virus. Throughout most of the year we have only conducted periodic toxicology testing while adhering to NYS OASAS guidance.

As we pushed through into the summer, we continued following our Department's re-opening plan in conjunction with our County plan. Work and life in general felt like it was slowly returning to a "new normal". However, as scientists forecasted, we saw a surge in virus infection rates beginning in the fall which has forced us all to take a step back.

As we continue to adjust and focus on the most efficient way to fulfill our Department mission, it is equally important for each of us to help out anyway or anywhere we can. I am very proud of our staff, as most have volunteered to assist the Genesee County Health Department with quarantine checks, working testing clinics, and now vaccination clinics.

Although this extraordinary time period has certainly been frustrating for most and devastating for some, if we continue to work together, discover new ways of doing things, while focusing on being good neighbors, we can emerge stronger and hopefully better as people, as a community and as a country.
